Learning from Failure at Work: *The Importance of Time and Social Context*

ABOUT THIS TALK

Failure is an ubiquitous experience for employees in contemporary organizations. Some emphasize that failure offers valuable learning opportunities by revealing a discrepancy between what was desired and what has been accomplished, others stress that failure is also a painful experience that threatens employees' self-esteem and thwarts learning. So why do some setbacks make us better at what we do — and others just leave us stuck?

This talk covers two studies examining the consequences of failure for creative performance, taken from a learning perspective. One study looks at the timing of failure as key to learning from it; the other looks at the role of team context.

Together, they highlight what managers and employees need to understand in order to foster learning from failure in the workplace.

THEMES FOR DISCUSSION

- i. The timing of failure: why when a setback happens shapes what is learned from it
- ii. The team as a resource: how social context supports (or blocks) learning from failure
- iii. Implications for managers: fostering a culture where employees learn from failure
